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The Gutenberg Yearbook

The Gutenberg Society has published the Gutenberg Yearbook every year since 1926. It is the central scientific publication organ of international Gutenberg research and contains specialist articles in German, English, French, Italian or Spanish.

The topics covered by the Yearbook are wide-ranging and include articles on the history of printing from its beginnings to the present day, on the history of paper, libraries, the book trade and publishing, and on typography, illustration and book binding. In spite of all the scholarship, care is taken to ensure that even the layman can read the book with pleasure and profit.



The high scientific quality of the contributions and the appreciation of the printed book are further emphasized by the careful typographic design and the high-quality layout of the yearbook. Outstanding typographers have been involved in the design of the Yearbook over the years, including Karl Klingspor, Christian Heinrich Kleukens, Max Caflisch, and Ralf de Jong.

Members of the Gutenberg Society receive a free copy of the current Year-book each year.

Johannes Cutenberg

Gutenberg, the inventor of movable type printing, is the father of mass communication. Born in Mainz around 1400, he developed his pioneering technology in Strasbourg and in Mainz, and from around 1452 to 1454 printed the voluminous 42-line Bible in Mainz, which was named the Gutenberg Bible after him.

From Mainz, the art of letterpress printing spread across the continent at lightning speed: in just 50 years, it was available in around 300 cities. The printing press, as a mediator of knowledge, information and entertainment, became the motor and carrier of cultural and intellectual development. Today, the written communication of the Gutenberg Galaxy continues to expand on the World Wide Web.

The International cutenberg Society

The Gutenberg Society is an international association for research into the history and development of printing technology and writing-oriented media. In addition, it provides non-material and material support for the Gutenberg Museum in Mainz.

The Gutenberg Society was founded on June 23, 1901, the day the Gutenberg Museum associated with it was opened, and is one of the most traditional scientific societies in Mainz. Its board is composed of representatives of public institutions (city, state, university) and personalities elected by the general members' meeting. The president is the Lord Mayor of the City of Mainz by virtue of his office.

Today, the Gutenberg Society has about 700 members in about 30 countries. As a scientific association, the Society brings together like-minded people from all over the world. It offers new members the opportunity to become part of this network and to benefit from it. There are many occasions: joint excursions in Germany and abroad, specialist lectures and conferences, the monthly discussion forum Jour Fixe or the regular general meetings, at which the Gutenberg Prize is awarded every two years.

The cutenberg Prize

Since 1968, the Gutenberg Society, together with the City of Mainz, has alternated annually with the printing city of Leipzig to award the Gutenberg Prize, endowed with 10,000 euros, for an outstanding artistic, technical or scientific achievement in the field of printing that is directly related to Gutenberg's invention.

The winners of this award have set standards with their achievements, particularly in the fields of book illustration, book production, book art and typography.

The Gutenberg Museum

The Gutenberg Museum in Mainz is a treasure house of the art of printing. It offers visitors the sight of two original copies of the Gutenberg Bible, surrounded by other prints from the inventor's workshop: the unique fragment of the Last Judgment, a letter of indulgence, a fragment of the Donat, and a copy of the Mainzer Catholicon.

A wide variety of printed works — from the incunabulum of the 15th century to the press printing of the present day — are displayed in the Gutenberg Museum alongside and in connection with the history of technology: presses, printing presses, casting and typesetting machines, and graphic devices are among the exhibits.
